#### **Regatta Presentations**

A presentation of medals to Men's and Women's First VIII and Second VIII Champion crews will take place at the Melbourne University Boat Club immediately after the regatta (10.45am – 11.00am). Winning crews, including their coach, are asked to meet on the first floor of the Boathouse at 10.45am. Each winning crew will be presented to spectators on the MUBC balcony.

All College rowers, spectators, family and friends are invited to attend.

The winning first VIII Colleges will be invited to race against a University of Sydney College at the 2025 Australian Boat Race later in the year.

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF INTERCOLLEGIATE ROWING

Intercollegiate rowing at the University of Melbourne began in 1881 with a four oared race between Trinity and Ormond. After four years, with Trinity winning on each occasion, the race became an annual contest for eight oared crews. Queen's College entered the fray in 1891, and Newman competed for the first time in 1918.

Originally the length of the race was two miles, on the Lower Yarra Course, but in 1909 the Upper Yarra Course of one and one-quarter miles was adopted. In 1918 Mr. Justice HB Higgins of the High Court of Australia presented the magnificent trophy, which has come to be identified with Intercollegiate rowing. The circumstances are explained in the following extract from a letter from the then Master of Ormond, DK Picken.

...Mr. Justice Higgins has vested a fund of 500 pounds in the Heads of the Colleges (as Trustees) for the encouragement of rowing, by means of a permanent trophy and memorial to be associated with the name of his son, the late Captain MB Higgins (Captain and Adjutant) of the 8th Light Horse Regiment AIF), formerly a member of Ormond College, Melbourne and later of Balliol College, Oxford, who was killed in action at El Magdhaba on 23rd December, 1916. The fund comes from Captain Higgins' arrears of pay. The trophy which is to be called the Mervyn Bournes Higgins Memorial Trophy, is to be held by the winning College...

In addition, the bequest also made provision for a small individual trophy for each oarsman; originally a two handled pewter mug, but since the last war an inscribed medallion. Apart from the war years, the Intercollegiate contest has been held every year, and was expanded to include a race for Second Eights for the Malcolm Russell Norton Trophy. Since 1923, the winning College Eight has raced against the Extra Collegiate crew for the John Laing Cup. Women's Intercollegiate rowing commenced in 1959 when members of Janet Clarke Hall decided that it was about time that women had a race of their own. Originally the women were few in number as they had not an opportunity to row at school. Thus, rowing was a new experience for most that entered the races. Races were held over 800 metres for the First's crews and 500 metres for the Seconds. The number of women who row has increased greatly in the years since women's Intercollegiate rowing was established due to the popularity of schoolgirl rowing.

Unlike the men, the women had originally not been able to compete for a trophy or medallion, but competed for honour and glory alone. In 1992 this changed with the presentation of inscribed glasses to the winning crew at a celebratory dinner, and in 1993 for the first time the winning women's crew competed for the Margot Foster & Richardson Shield, similar in size to the Higgins Trophy, but reflecting the modern rowing woman of the 1990's. In 1999 the Susan Oddie Sypkens Shield for the winners of the women's Second Eights was presented for the first time.

Intercollegiate rowing was further enhanced in 1995 with the combining of the men's and women's regattas. It is appropriate that the men and women of the colleges who share so much should be able to share also the excitement and glory of one Intercollegiate Regatta.

#### Trivia:

The first intercollegiate boat race was held in 1881 between Trinity and Ormond men's VIII. Trinity won this race and the following five races.

Three dead-heats have occurred between Ormond and Trinity (1897); Ormond and Queen's (1921); and Trinity and Ormond (1946) – all men's VIII races.

Ormond leads the men's First VIII total races won with 57; and Ormond also leads the women's First VIII races with 21.



## MERVYN BOURNES HIGGINS TROPHY



The Mervyn Bournes Higgins is perpetually awarded to the winning college 1st VIII Crews of the College Regatta. The trophy is too large to be handed over at presentation, so is passed between to the winning college by the previous holder post-regatta.

The following excerpt from the book *Well Rowed University*, provides insight into the history and significance of the trophy:

At a meeting in March 1917, Mr Crosthwaite reported that Mr Justice Higgins had asked him to approach the MUBC committee in regard to His Honour and Mrs Higgins founding a trophy for the Intercollegiate Boat Race to commemorate the memory of their son, Captain Mervyn Bournes Higgins MC, who had been killed on active duty with the 8th Light Horse in the AIF just before Christmas in the previous year. He had survived Gallipoli, only to be killed at El Magdhaba in Equpt. Crosthwaite and delegates from the colleges were to draw up a scheme and submit it to M Justine Higgins. After various drafting sessions and discussions, a Trust Deed was signed on 10 May 1918 pursuant to which Mr Justice Higgins gifted £500. The trustees included the Masters of Ormond and Queen's and the Warden of Trinity. The objects of the trust were the benefitting of the affiliated colleges and the encouragement of intercollegiate rowing and to perpetuate the memory of the late Mervyn Bournes Higgins. There was to be a permanent trophy known as the Mervyn Bournes

Higgins Trophy and a suitable book on parchment to contain a complete record of all intercollegiate boat races. The gift was acknowledged in the Club minutes of 26 March 1919:


This exceedingly generous gift from His Honour is greatly valued not only because of the sentiment and prestige added to the race but because there is perpetually also associated with it the name of a fine stalwart oarsman and gallant Australian solider.

In 1919... Plans got underway to revive the intervarsityand intercollegiate races, the latter now including Newman College. To facilitate four crews racing in the intercollegiate race (Trinity, Ormond, Queen's and Newman) it was necessary to have two heats with the winners racing off in a final. For the 1919 College boat race, heats were rowed on 9 May with the final taking place the next day. In addition to being the first intercollegiate race in which Newman would participate, this race would be the first where the newly instated Mervyn Bournes Higgins Trophy was competed for. Ormond College beat Queen's while Newman was too good for Trinity. In the final, Ormond won the Mervyn Bournes Higgins trophy for the first time by defeating Newman by two lengths in a spirited race.

Parking in the event area is limited. The above map highlights options within walking distance of the Yarra River and spectator viewing area on Henley Landing, Boathouse Drive (blue circle).

Blue Circle: Boathouse Drive will be closed to all traffic and parking for the duration of the event.

2. Federation Square undercover car park (Paid) – situated on the North Side of the river, within a short walking distance across St. Kilda Rd foot bridge to the boathouses and Henley landing. Enter off Flinders and Russel Street.

3. Lithgow/Birdwood Avenues – within walking distance (5-10 mins) south of viewing area – cross at Alexandra Avenue lights.

4. Alexandra Avenue - also within short (5 mins ) walking distance along the river trail which runs alongside the course.

Public Toilets are located next to the Skate Park on the south side of Boathouse Drive in between the finishing box and MUBC Shed. This is highlighted on the map by the blue T.
